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Mechanics Hall and WICN Public Radio announce June Club 321 event

Noah Preminger to perform on Thursday, June 29

June 14, 2023 (Worcester, MA) — The Noah Preminger Quartet will perform at <u>Mechanics Hall's Club 321</u> on Thursday, May 18 at 7:00 p.m. Known for their virtuosic improvisations and expressive compositions, the quartet features saxophonist Noah Preminger, accompanied by Max Light on the guitar, Kim Cass on the bass, and Rob Garcia on the drums. Club 321 seating is cabaret-style tables in Mechanics Hall's elegant Washburn Hall, with cash bar and light refreshments available for purchase. During the program, <u>Fuel America</u> will offer complimentary coffee, and <u>Redemption Rock Brewing Company</u> will have free beer tasting. In addition, patrons will be able to browse an art exhibit sponsored by <u>Juniper Rag</u>, an independent Massachusetts art and lifestyle magazine.

Tickets are \$18 purchased in advance; \$20 at the door. Ticketholders must be at least 21 years old. Doors open at 6:15 p.m. Mechanics Hall is located at 321 Main Street in Worcester. To learn more and purchase tickets, visit <u>mechanicshall.org/club321</u>.

About Noah Preminger

Brooklyn-based saxophonist Noah Preminger, and winner of Downbeat Magazine's "Rising Star Best Tenor Saxophonist," has recorded over twelve critically acclaimed albums. Preminger was born in 1986 and grew up in Canton, Connecticut. Just after his 21st birthday, he released his debut album, *Dry Bridge Road*, which was named Debut of the Year in the Village Voice "Critics Poll." The saxophonist has performed on key stages from the United States to Europe and Australia, and has played or recorded with Jason Moran, Dave Holland, John Patitucci, Fred Hersch, Dave Douglas, Billy Hart, Joe Lovano, Victor Lewis, John and Bucky Pizzarelli, Cecil McBee, George Cables, and Roscoe Mitchell.

Built in 1857 by WCMA, Mechanics Hall is internationally regarded as one of the world's great concert halls for its superb acoustics and 19th-century elegance. Regionally, it is widely considered to be Worcester's finest meeting place. The world's most renowned orchestras and performers—from the London Philharmonic to Yo-Yo Ma and Ella Fitzgerald to Linda Rondstat—have taken the Hall's stage. Among the many luminaries who have spoken at Mechanics Hall are Charles Dickens, Susan B. Anthony, Frederick Douglass, and Mark Twain. In addition to serving as a premiere venue and recording site, Mechanics Hall offers inspiring cultural experiences for diverse audiences through a variety of creative initiatives—including free concerts, community events, a youth chorus, and collaborative programs with local colleges and non-profit organizations.
